
To date we have raised more than 30 million dollars to support prostate cancer research and raise public awareness!

Senior Scientist, Cancer Therapeutics Program - Ottawa Hospital Research Institute Professor, Departments of Medicine and Biochemistry, Microbiology and Immunology -University of Ottawa


Dr. Michael McBurney recently received the Dr. J. David Grimes Research Career Achievement Award. Dr. McBurney has played a crucial role in building the Ottawa health research community by founding and leading the Centre for Cancer Therapeutics and his research has had a major impact on our understanding of cancer and stem cells.



Dr. John Lewis

Frank and Carla Sojonky Chair in Prostate Cancer Research at University of Alberta, Associate Professor, Department of Oncology - University of Alberta

The Lewis lab utilizes real-time intravital imaging of the tumour microenvironment to learn about the critical steps of cancer progression. We are investigating novel nanoparticles that are being developed for the early detection of prostate cancer, drug delivery, and the in vivo study of tumour cell invasion and metastasis. Connecting these intimately related projects is an integrated research platform that we've developed for long term time-lapse intravital imaging of human cancer progression.





Dr. Juanita M. Crook

Dr. Crook is Professor of Radiation Oncology at the University of British Columbia, British Columbia Cancer Agency, Center for the Southern Interior, Kelowna, Canada.

Dr. Crook is an internationally recognized leader in Prostate Brachytherapy.

Dr. Gerard Morton

Affiliate scientist - Odette Cancer Centre - Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre Radiation oncologist, Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre

Associate professor, department of radiation oncology, University of Toronto The focus of Dr. Morton's research is the use of image-guided technology to guide interstitial radiotherapy of prostate cancer. He has developed novel methods of delivering high dose-rate (HDR) brachytherapy to treat prostate cancer through clinical research. These protocols have been widely adopted internationally and have set new standards for combining HDR brachytherapy and external beam radiotherapy to treat intermediate and high-risk prostate cancer.
